Exhibition Overview

Shirow Masamune, creator of the immensely popular manga *Ghost in the Shell*, made his major debut with *Appleseed* in 1985, going on to launch the *Ghost in the Shell* series in 1989. He adopted futuristic technology that had yet to spread in the public conscious with his unique perspective, and his worldview, one that seemed to predict our modern information society, fascinated countless readers. His highly detailed drawings, the immense volume of information in the plotting, and his text that escapes beyond the borders, brought passion to his works and stirred the imagination of the readers. The worldview of Shirow Masamune, woven with his deep philosophical explorations, influenced numerous subsequent creators, giving rise to works in a wide range of genres.

Black Magic, an early story collection, depicted a world governed by a super-giant computer called Nemesis. Appleseed is an SF action manga that depicts former SWAT officers Deunan and Briareos, the latter a full-body cyborg, as they survive in an abandoned city after the end of World War Five. Dominion is a work that comically depicts Leona and her beloved squad of Bonaparte-class small sized tanks in their struggle against a gang of villains and warriors. Ghost in the Shell depicts the struggles of Public Security Section 9 under the direct control of the Prime Minister. Orion is a fantasy work that depicts the struggles of extremely ancient wizards and the gods they summon surrounding the magical nine-headed Nāga.

This exhibition traces the works of Shirow Masamune, covering both his Analog Manuscripts and Digital Manuscripts, through his wide range of output up to his current activities, accompanied by a plethora of books and comments from the artist, and even touching on his personal side. Enjoy the first large scale exhibition by Shirow Masamune, an amalgamation of the manga and SF exhibits held by the Setagaya Literary Museum to date, as we approach our 30th anniversary.

Profile

Shirow Masamune

Manga artist and illustrator Shirow Masamune was born in Hyogo Prefecture. He began producing manga and illustrations in 1980 and made his commercial debut with *Appleseed* in 1985. In 1989, he began producing his most well-known manga series, *Ghost in the Shell*. He served as co-director of the anime work *Black Magic M-66*. He is also active in a variety of other fields, including games and art books.

Juza Unno and Japanese Science Fiction

Saturday, April 26 - Sunday, September 28, 2025

Exhibition Overview

- "For the time being, The Theft of the Earth is just the title of a science novel. However, who can guarantee that the Theft of the Earth incident might not happen in the world of the future?" (Juza Unno, The Theft of the Earth)

Juza Unno (1897 - 1949), often called the Father of Japanese SF, wrote numerous works of science fiction (described as "fantasy science novels" at the time) during a period spanning the time around WWII, achieving immense popularity. The writers considered part of the subsequent first generation of Japanese SF authors, such as Osamu Tezuka and Sakyo Komatsu, were all fans of Unno in their childhood.

A scientist and engineer involved in the development of the vacuum tube, Unno debuted with his first publication, *The Mysterious Death in the Electric Bath*, in 1928. He subsequently became known as a unique writer of detective novels. Since that time, he pioneered the genre of science adventure novels for boys, applying his rich imagination and scientific knowledge to realistic depictions of such themes as robots, rockets, artificial organs, extraterrestrial life, war in space, and time travel.

This exhibition traces the trajectory of Juza Unno, his friendship with fellow Setagaya residents Seishi Yokomizo and Mushitaro Oguri, and the first generation of SF authors such as Osamu Tezuka, Shinichi Hoshi, Sakyo Komatsu, Yasutaka Tsutsui, and Aritsune Toyota, who were deeply influenced by Unno. The exhibition searches for the origins of the imagination represented by Japanese SF that has spread to boundless modes of expression today in novels, manga, anime, film, and games.
